- Interactive sessions of faculty members are organised with acclaimed professionals from academics and profession.

1.4 Whether there is any revision/update of regulation or syllabi, if yes, mention their salient aspects.

The University follows the widest consultative process in designing and development of the curriculum. Even though the authority belongs to the Board of Studies (Undergraduate) and Board of Studies (Postgraduate), the University right from the inception has followed the practice of placing the draft curriculum before the Karnataka Law Colleges Principals Conference (KARLAWPRICON) convened by the University wherein the Principals of all affiliated colleges participate.

The University gets the draft syllabi prepared by the senior professors/ faculty members in the concerned subjects. Generally two or more than two academicians will undertake this exercise. Then the drafts will be placed before the Principals conference.

In the first KARLAWPRICON the whole of the curriculum of Five year B.A., LL.B., B.B.A., LL.B., Three year LL.B. and One year LL.M. were presented in the daylong conference through power point presentation. By consensus the suggestions were incorporated. In addition, hard copies were circulated for deferred consideration in consultation with other faculty at the college level. The Principals were requested to suggest changes if any by a cut off date. Then all the suggestions were consolidated and put through the statutory channel and notified for implementation.

The University periodically brings about changes in the syllabi of various courses whenever they are necessitated by the change in law, or required by the competent authorities or suggested by the faculty members of various colleges.

In the academic year 2018-19 the statutory bodies of the University, namely Syndicate and Academic Council took decision to introduce the continuous assessment of the students by prescribing 80 marks theory and 20 marks internal assessment pattern.

Regular consultative process is adhered to in formulating syllabus for various programmes. Experts from pioneer institutions and from the cognate fields are also used in curriculum making. The University keeps its mind open to suggestions from the member of the judiciary, professionals and academicians in connection with the revision of the syllabus.

After experimenting with the system of combination of subjects, when the demand came from various corners that the number of courses in particular disciplines are to be increased to provide an opportunity to students to acquire specialised knowledge in

the chosen field, the University decided to introduce Major-Minor system in the 5 year B.A., LL.B. programme. Experts were identified from different Universities of Karnataka along with the senior faculty members who have taught those courses in law colleges, to draft syllabi for various subjects and the same was placed before the BOS to which senior faculty members in the concerned subjects were invited as special invitees. The curriculum notified after approval by authorities as required by the KSLU Act.

The University constituted an Experts Committee under the Chairmanship of the Dean with Senior Principals of affiliated colleges and Experts from National Law School of India University as members to review the syllabus of all law subjects. The work of revising the syllabi of various courses was assigned to different principals. All of them submitted the draft syllabi which was compiled and circulated to all colleges inviting their suggestions. An opportunity was also provided to the students to give feedback about the draft. The suggestions were incorporated and the draft syllabi was placed before the BOS and other authorities for consideration. The syllabus is duly approved.

2.6 Innovative processes adopted by the institution in Teaching and Learning:

The University prepares an academic calendar for teaching learning and assessment. The commencement of the academic year is with the orientation programme or induction programme for the newly admitted students. As a part of the induction programme special thrust is made to make the student understand the significance of the study of law as per prescribed scheme of the University. The faculty initiate the programme as per the timetable for the conduct of classes/seminars/project by lecture method and the use of other modern teaching and learning activities. The University provides ample scope for learning through well equipped and enriched library having internet access, online journals, ICT resources and other study materials. Faculty members also conduct some remedial classes for the students to enable them to cope up with the subject of their choice. The University invites people of eminence on regular

basis keeping in mind the specific requirements of a subject, to supplement classroom teaching with special lectures, workshops, conferences and seminars.

The university monitors the performance of the students through Continuous Internal Assessment Tests, Assignments/Seminars, Attendance, Mid Semester Examination and End-Semester Examination. Practical examinations are conducted prior to the theory examinations. The written part of the project, the seminar presentation and viva-voce are conducted and marked by external/internal evaluators. Accordingly the students prepare themselves to meet the standards and challenges.

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2.8 Examination/ Evaluation Reforms initiated by the Institution (for example: Open Book Examination, Bar Coding, Double Valuation, Photocopy, Online Multiple Choice Questions)

The Examination section of the University has introduced the following innovative measures such as:

1. Digitalization of filling of examination forms.
2. Exam related payments are made online.
3. Answer books in each packet are scanned through a latest scanner called “Fire Eye”, which stores the Registration number marked by the candidate, and pre-printed Barcode. While scanning, the scanner will print a unique numeric code of 7 digits at three places on the front page of the answer book. The top portion of the answer book is detached before answer book is sent for valuation.

Semester pattern is followed for both UG as well as PG programmes. In addition to written examinations the university has developed continuous evaluation component in which students are supposed to do project work, give seminar presentation and appear for viva voce and tests. For LL.M. One Year Programme there are mainly two components of evaluation viz. periodical evaluations spread throughout the semester and end semester exams at the end of each semester and each component has max. 50 marks and the students are required to write a dissertation under the supervision of a teacher.

- The University has also initiated the practice of Repeat Examination for LL.B. (Hons.) programme for students who want to improve their performance in the examinations. Such students are offered a window opportunity to appear in the specially scheduled examinations.
- A student can apply for, and get photo copy of his/her paper after 10 days from the date of announcement of results, 15 days is the time limit for applying for revaluation and 20 days for challenge valuation.
- The entire examination system is computerized and follows coding of Answer scripts for central evaluation.
- The examination records of the students are stored in a database. The examination results are announced on the University website and are also mailed to all the Affiliated Law Colleges
- The results are usually declared within 30 working days from the completion of the last exam. The policy is to declare the result of final year on priority and the practice has been that they are declared within 12 days. The results are hosted in the university's website and students can download their results individually and colleges can have the entire result sheet. Even in individual cases where there may be a delay because of certain technicalities the students are intimated provisional results.
- The answer scripts are shuffled such that a packet of 20 papers will not have more than one answer paper of any particular college. It is computer that codes such mixed papers and identity portion is removed before answer script is sent to evaluation. The code number of any candidate will not be made available to any staff of examination section, as the programmer seals it and opens only after evaluation. The registration number of candidates does not figure either in evaluation or in processing of result and it comes only while printing of result sheet. There will be a reviewer for every 4 examiners and 20% of answer papers are reviewed. The evaluation takes place at a single building and all rooms are fitted with CC Cameras. The candidates are free to get their answer booklets photocopied and marks allocated question wise. Candidates can apply for revaluation or challenge valuation, if not happy with marks awarded.

The said committee periodically meets to review the progress reports of the research scholars and addresses the issues relating to research. The observations made by the Doctoral Committee are communicated to the respective research scholars for necessary corrections and review.

The University periodically organises seminars, conferences, symposia, etc. in association with institutions such as National Human Rights Commission, New Delhi, State Human Rights Commission, Bangalore, Karnataka Institute for Law and Parliamentary Reform, Bangalore, Karnataka Higher Education Council, Bangalore, etc.

The University has entered into Memorandum of Understanding with several leading institutions in order to promote research activities.

The University encourages the faculty to participate and present papers in the conferences, workshops, seminars etc. in the emerging areas. The faculty members are given duty leave to participate in the conferences. To hone the research skills of the faculty and students of affiliated law colleges the University is periodically publishing its journals namely, KSLU Law Journal, Students Law Review and Journal of Sports and Entertainment Law. The research articles of the faculty and students of affiliated law colleges are published in these journals. Two best articles written by the students are awarded with cash prizes.

The University periodically organises two moot court competitions, one in vernacular language and another one on International Law, in order to promote research skills among the students of the University. The University encourages the students to participate in moot court competitions organised by reputed institutions.

The University organises Model Parliament Competition in order to acquaint the students with the Parliamentary procedures and practices. In these competitions the students are asked to draft bills relating to burning issues and students take up discussions on these bills.

The University is regularly organising “Legal Touch Stone”-Students Law Festival wherein the students are given the opportunity to present research papers on the recent developments in law.

The University regularly organises faculty interaction programme with the legal luminaries such as judges of the High Court, Professors of esteemed institutions, etc.

Criterion – V

5. Student Support and Progression

5.1 Contribution of IQAC in enhancing awareness about Student Support Services.

1. Orientation on the scope of law course for new entrants to the law college was conducted for three days in the month of August 2017.
2. Separate library orientation on ‘how to use library including e-resources’ was conducted.
3. University also provides opportunity for students to hone their advocacy skills by participating in national and international moot court competitions and provides full financial support to the participants. Panel of mooters were selected to represent the Law School in the national and international level Moot competitions.
4. The University meets out the expenses of the students who participate in curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities to represent the University in various national and international competitions.
5. To keep pace with new developments, workshops/conference/seminars have been organized in the emerging areas to create a platform to the students to enrich their knowledge.
6. The University has constituted SC/ST Cell to promote the interest of the SC/ST students. The Cell ensures the effective implementation of reservation policy and other welfare measures for SC/ST students. The University also provides SC/ST Students Book Bank facility wherein students can borrow books and retain them for a semester.
7. Students were properly guided to obtain various scholarships funded by the government for backward classes and meritorious students. The SC/ST Cell also assists in availing all facilities provided by the government to such backward class students.
8. Remedial classes were conducted for students who are unable to comprehend the subjects in English.
9. The law school trains the students to get equipped with language skills through *Young Nani* English club.

10. As part of curricular activities, students were sent to different institutions for internship.
11. Students are trained in professional skills like negotiation, mediation, conciliation, etc. through simulation exercises as part of the curriculum. Students were also trained in mock trial, moot court training, client interviewing to imbibe advocacy skills.
12. To motivate the students to render social services, NSS unit and Red Cross Units selected new members. Service activities like legal aid camps, legal awareness programmes, distribution of Kannada news bulletin '*Kanoonu Kirana*', etc., were undertaken. Students of Law were actively involved in Legal awareness campaigns organised in collaboration with District Legal Services Authority, Dharwad.

5.2 Efforts made by the institution for tracking the progression

- a) At the beginning of every semester meeting of faculty members will be conducted to discuss 'how to enhance the overall performance of the students'; list of students who need special attention will be prepared and initiatives are taken to improvise their academic performance.
- b) Seminars and class tests were conducted in classrooms to help the students to improve their academic performance.
- c) Performance of the students and their attendance status were regularly reported to their parents and to keep track of the students, Class teachers were appointed to help the students regarding their academic and non-academic matters.
- d) Students were encouraged to write and present research papers in national and international conferences/seminars. They were also guided to write scholarly articles in reputed journals.
- e) The University publishes *Karnataka State Law University Student Law Review* annually, which is exclusively meant for well researched articles from the students of law and it comprises of board of student editors.
- f) Similarly, the *KSLU's Journal of Sports and Entertainment Law* is brought under the editorship of students to which students can also contribute by writing articles.

- g) The University conducts Repeat Examination for LL.B. Honours programme for students who want to improve their performance in the examinations. Such students are offered a window opportunity to appear in the specially scheduled examinations.

5.4 Details of student support mechanism for coaching for competitive examinations (If any)

- The Karnataka State Law University is constituted for imparting quality legal education and as professional institution; University's focus is to create law professionals. To aid the students who are interested in competitive examinations, adequate number of books have been kept in the library and the teachers guide them in the respective areas. The University has also subscribed for e-resources like, *MANUPATRA*, Westlaw India, Heinonline, Inflightnet, which aids the students to acquire knowledge in the respective fields.
- In addition to this, University conducted special lectures on different topics of by eminent scholars in specialised areas to equip them on recent developments.
- University organised academic activities through Constitutional Law Club, Human Rights Club, Environmental Law Club to update the current developments and emerging trends in the respective area.
- The University guides the LL.M. students as to how to prepare for NET and SLET.
- Apart from these, the University syllabus contains 'Moot Court Exercises and Internship' as a compulsory subject, in which students of law have to undergo Moot Court exercises. This helps the students to familiarize with various stages of trial in civil and criminal cases. They also imbibe the skills of client interviewing and hone advocacy skills and research abilities. Each student has to compulsorily argue on at least 3 problems and submit written copies signed by course teacher. Students are trained in professional skills like negotiation, mediation, conciliation, etc. through simulation exercises as part of the curriculum. As a professional course, it helps the students in the selection of judges and prosecutors.

5.6 Details of student counselling and career guidance

- The students of law are oriented about the career opportunities available them in the Orientation programme conducted at the University.
- Under the office of the Directorate of Student Welfare, Career Guidance Workshop was conducted for all the final year students. Eminent speakers and achievers from the field were invited to address the students on various career opportunities that are open for them after graduation/post graduation.
- Law school has adopted 'mentor' system, wherein each faculty is assigned with responsibility of 30 students. The faculty concerned will take special care of their students on all aspects. The mentor takes care of the attendance of the mentee in the class. The emotional, academic and cultural support is provided by the faculty who is acting as a mentor for those students to minimize student stress, anxiety or embarrassment. The mentors will update the progress of the mentees to their parents about the behavioural and discipline matters, achievements and honing their talents, extra co- curricular achievements along with their academic performances. There will be regular meetings conducted with the parents to review the performance of students.

5.7 Details of campus placement

- As a professional University, KSLU focuses and gives intensive training to develop professional skills to the students. Hence majority of the students of the University choose to practice law as advocates or to join law firms or corporate sectors as advisors.
- Some of the students continue their studies and complete Masters Degree course from the University.
- Those who are interested to join judiciary as judges or prosecutors will write the respective examinations and placed in the respective positions.
- Besides that, the students have to do their internship during vacation in different establishments, including well known law firms. Some of them will be serving in those law firms after completion of the course.

The University follows the Management Information System through the internal organisational structure of KSLU. The hierarchy of the flow of information is as follows:

Officers of the University:

Along with the above hierarchy for the flow of information, University conducts various meetings which are as follows:

- Faculty meeting
- Non-teaching Staff meeting
- Heads of the sections' meeting
- Committee and sub-committee meetings

The University takes conscious efforts to build a relationship with the students, parents, alumni, industry and society at large. The University is in touch with the local Bar Associations and judiciary. It values the suggestion that come from these bodies. The University is also communicating to the different stakeholders through the University web site.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The University follows the widest consultative process in designing and development of the curriculum. The draft syllabi are prepared by the senior professors/ faculty members in the concerned subjects. Although, the final authority belongs to the Board of Studies in both Undergraduate and Postgraduate, the University follows the practice of placing the draft curriculum prepared by the concerned teachers before the Karnataka Law Colleges Principals Conference (KARLAWPRICON) convened by the University wherein, the Principals of all affiliated colleges participate. Hence timely review is made by the Board of Studies to incorporate recent trends in the respective programmes. The emphasis of the University in reviewing and upgrading the Syllabi is with a view to develop Employability skills of the stakeholders.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

The University follows a learner centric teaching learning process and pursue the same through the academic calendar. The commencement of the academic year is with the orientation programme or induction programme for the newly admitted students with focus on the students to understand the significance of the study of law. In addition to the new entrants, orientation programme is also given on semester wise subjects to other students as well with a view to enable them to have an overview of the subject before

they are introduced to their subjects. The University is providing ample scope for learning and updating through well equipped library having internet access and legal electronic data base. Faculty members also conduct some remedial classes for the students to enable them to cope up with the subject of their choice. Mentorship system is also introduced for the holistic development of the students wherein, a group of students are brought under respective teachers who will enable the students to overcome their difficulties. The University invites people of eminence on regular basis keeping in mind the specific requirements of a subject, to supplement classroom teaching with special lectures, workshops, conferences and seminars. In addition to regular courses the University is providing certificate courses in three subjects namely, Aviation Law, Water Law and Information Technology which will be add-on courses for the students. To achieve the objective University also follows a co-operative teaching system.

The university monitors the performance of the students through Continuous Internal Assessment Tests, Assignments/Seminars, Attendance, Mid Semester Examination and End-Semester Examination for UG and PG. Practical examinations in clinical courses are conducted prior to the theory examinations. The written submission of the projects, the seminar presentation and viva-voce are conducted and marked by external/internal evaluators well before the commencement of examination which enables the students to prepare themselves confidently to meet the standards and challenges. Feedback taken from students also helps to take timely decision for qualitative improvement.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

Examination relevant information is available in the University regulations, prospectus, academic calendar. Other circulars and notices are available at university website, notice boards and are also mailed to all affiliated Colleges. As such, all stakeholders are fully made aware about the evaluation process. The exam section very proactively responds to queries from all stakeholders. In University Semester pattern is followed for both UG as well as PG programmes. In addition to written examinations the university has developed continuous evaluation component in which students are supposed to do project work, give seminar presentation and appear for viva voce and tests. For LL.M One Year Programme there are mainly two components of evaluation viz. periodical evaluations spread throughout the semester and end semester exams at the

end of each semester and each component has max. 50 marks and the students are required to write a dissertation under the supervision of a teacher.

The University has also initiated the practice of Repeat Examination for LL.B. (Hons.) programme for students who want to improve their performance in the examinations. Such students are offered a window opportunity to appear in the specially scheduled examinations.

The entire examination system is computerized and follows coding of Answer scripts for central evaluation. The examination records of the students are stored in a database. The examination results are announced on the University website and are also mailed to all the Affiliated Law Colleges.

The results are usually declared within 30 working days from the completion of the last exam. The policy is to declare the result of final year on priority and the practice has been that they are declared within 12 days. The results are hosted in the university's website and students can download their results individually and colleges can have the entire result sheet. Even in individual cases where there may be a delay because of certain technicalities the students are intimated provisional results.

The answer scripts are shuffled such that a packet of 20 papers will not have more than one answer paper of any particular college. It is computer that codes such mixed papers and identity portion is removed before answer script is sent to evaluation. The code number of any candidate will not be made available to any staff of examination section, as the programmer seals it and opens only after evaluation. The registration number of candidates does not figure either in evaluation or in processing of result and it comes only while printing of result sheet. There will be a reviewer for every 4 examiners and 20% of answer papers are reviewed. The evaluation takes place at a single building and all rooms are fitted with CC Cameras. The candidates are free to get their answer booklets photocopied and marks allocated question wise. Candidates can apply for revaluation or challenge valuation, if not happy with marks awarded.

The examination section is planning to introduce OMR Sheets for filling the examination application instead of examination application form which will help to speed up the entire examination process.

6.3.4 Research and Development

The Doctoral Committee of the University is periodically reviewing the progress reports of the research scholars and addresses all the issues relating to research under the guidance of recognised guides. The Doctoral Committee has introduced guidelines exclusively for research projects. The Board has recently recognised two more guides. The observations made by the Doctoral Committee are communicated to the respective research scholars for necessary corrections and review.

The University has signed MoU with reputed institutions with the objective to encourage research and development. Presently University have research centres in Mangalore and two PG Centres in Bengaluru and Mangaluru. In addition, students and the faculty members are encouraged to participate in International, National Seminars and Workshops in the areas of their interest and also to publish the research articles in various journals of the University namely,

- KSLU Journal (Biannual)
- Student Law Review (Annual)
- Journal of Sports and Entertainment Law (Annual)

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

Library - The policy decisions on library matters are vested with the Library Committee (LC). The recommendations of the Committee are implemented with the approval of the Syndicate. All decisions relating to the utilization of funds for the purchase of the books / journals and e-resources from the library grants are taken by the Committee. The significant initiatives of the library are subscription of E-books, and designated students for training the researchers in using E-resources.

ICT - University has set up well-equipped ICT Cell in the library where there are number of computers with broad band internet connection and the campus is WI-FI enabled. Students and faculty members have unlimited access to the internet. The University has subscribed to well-known e-learning resources like Manupatra, Heinonline, Westlaw India, etc. through which a large number of national and international on-line journals can be accessed .The students are also given specialized training in using the data bases. Recently University has redesigned and up graded the University website in both regional and English language.

Infrastructure - University's new law school building which includes all the facilities like High technology class room, auditorium, conference hall, moot court hall, open air theatre including Registrar and Vice Chancellors chamber is ready to be inaugurated and occupied which is constructed with a cost of 1890 lakhs. New boys hostel construction has started with the estimation of 1050 Lakhs which will be three storied building consisting of 68 rooms having accommodating capacity of 136 students. One more floor is added to the existing boys training school with 16 additional rooms. As of now, the total 52 rooms can accommodate 109 students which was constructed with the budget estimate of Rs.95 lakhs. Vice Chancellor and Registrar (Eval.) and (Adm.) and three storied staff quarters running to a total of 12 flats is tendered for an amount of 524 Lakhs and 469 Lakhs respectively.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

The University has a well-qualified pool of human resources consisting of 11 permanent faculty for Law, 3 temporary full time faculty for non law subjects and 7 guest faculty for other law and non law subjects. The University has MOUs with various other Universities that promote faculty exchange under which expert faculty are invited to deliver lectures to enrich students with inter disciplinary approach. The University has sent a proposal to UGC for establishing Academic Staff College (HRD Section) for training teachers from its Affiliated Law Colleges by conducting faculty empowerment programmes like Orientation Courses, Refresher Courses etc.

The selection of the faculty members is done by following the UGC norms as to qualification and experience through the duly constituted selection committee. Merit is the sole criteria in the selection process of the faculty members. The approval of the Syndicate is taken for all appointments of the faculty. The university has sufficient number of qualified and competent faculty for all subjects. Faculty are encouraged to attend Refresher and Orientation Courses, Training Programmes, Seminars / Conferences/Workshops to enrich and update their knowledge

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

The University encourages diversity in its faculty recruitment by advertising on University website, national newspapers etc. The UGC norms are strictly followed in recruitment to appoint talented and diversified faculty members.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

The University is one of its kinds to provide legal education and hence emphasis is more towards development of advocacy skills and the like.

The University has initiated the practice of Repeat Examination for LL.B. (Hons.) programme for students who want to improve their performance in the examinations. Such students are offered a window opportunity to appear in the specially scheduled examinations.

The entire examination system is computerized and follows coding of Answer scripts for central evaluation. The examination records of the students are stored in a database. The examination results are announced in the University website and are also mailed to all the Affiliated Law Colleges.

Recently, as part of examination reforms, the University has internalised four Clinical course papers also.

6.10 What efforts are made by the University to promote autonomy in the affiliated/constituent colleges?

The University is updating the affiliated colleges with the guidelines, notifications and circulars issued by the University Grants Commission(UGC) on a regular basis in order to make them self sufficient. If the affiliated law colleges fulfil the norms prescribed by UGC, they are encouraged to obtain autonomous status.

6.11 Activities and support from the Alumni Association

Alumni Association of the University is providing the ongoing students to peruse internship and to procure placements in prestigious institutions wherein, most of the previous students are well placed. They also contribute to keep up the rich tradition of the University by acting as judges in moot court competitions and also by chairing important events organised by the University. Further, the alumni who have become judicial officers are invited to give training to the students to take up judicial service.

6.12 Activities and support from the Parent – Teacher Association

The University is convening the periodical meetings of the parents to chalk out programmes under the aegis of Parent – Teacher Association. The University is getting support from Parent – Teacher Association for the overall development of the students. In this regard, Parent – Teacher Association is annually organizing Student Law Fest in the name of “*Legal Touch Stone*” to encourage the academic and cultural instincts in the students. In this law fest, students are allowed to present papers on current issues to

develop research skills of the students. Client counselling and client interviewing is also organised to develop the advocacy skills, cultural activities are also organised

6.13 Development programmes for support staff

The University organises training programmes by the experts in the field for support staff in relation to up-keeping of accounts, file maintenance, use of technology in official automation, personality development programmes, health awareness etc.

6.14 Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly

The University in collaboration with Forest Department, Government of Karnataka has planted 1400 saplings. The University has taken a step to make the University eco friendly by an innovative initiative of Roof water harvesting which can recharge three bore wells. In tune with the initiative of the State government, the university has forwarded the proposal for the installation of solar plates with a view to have our own renewable energy resource for an estimated budget of Rs. 100 Lakh.
