Sri Venkateswara College has a partial inhouse information management for the following modules that is being used for academic and administrative purposes. a) Library -The library at Sri Venkateswara College is partially automated with LIBSYSS software and is connected to Delhi University Library System (DULS) and NLIST (INFLIBNET) for access to EBooks and journals. b) Accounts Management System - Sri Venkateswara College has its own integrated Payroll management and PF Management system developed inhouse. In addition, accounts management is supported by use of Tally software. c) Student Progression Data Issue of Provisional Certificate is provided to the students by inhouse software generated. d) Student Information System : • Admission Data - The admission process for UG students is carried out as per the guidelines of the University of Delhi. An inhouse student portal provides the complete data of the students enrolled in the college with their details captured from University data. This information

is used for printing of barcoded I cards. • Student Login Portal: Every student who has enrolled in the College is provided with a login detail to view his/her attendance, internal assessment and other notices added from time to time. • Attendance Management System provides faculty to mark the attendance data coursewise on daily basis and provides the user with a report. • Internal Assessment Portal is provided to faculty to upload internal assessment marks and the report is then forwarded to central assessment committee for further action. • Examination Fee: Students are provided with the facility to submit fees online through a payment gateway.

#### 1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Sri Venkateswara College is a constituent college affiliated to the University of Delhi. The College offers 20 UG courses and PG courses(Registration only). Sri Venkateswara College also offers several Certificate Courses( Self Financing) to enrich students experience beyond curriculum . The College follows the academic calendar and the curriculum laid by the University of Delhi (DU). The College deploys a number of action plans for its effective implementation at various levels: Curriculum Documentation: The syllabus is prepared by the respective departments of the University of Delhi. The departments take inputs from all the college teachers by inviting their subject representatives. DU provides proper guidelines for teaching methods, number of lectures required for that specific course, tutorial and practical classes etc. Internal Assessment rules are framed and amended by the University of Delhi from time to time. The same is informed by the College administration to all the Departments/Centres & Units. The syllabi of all the courses are documented and uploaded in the University of Delhi and the College website Curriculum Delivery: After the communication received by the University to the Principal of the college, Principal communicates the syllabi and other guidelines to the respective departments in the College • Staff Council appointed committee and other departmental committees determine the work load, recommend recruitments and prepare the necessary infrastructural and IT resources (soft wares etc.). • Time Table committee prepares the Time tables for all the departments taking into view the infrastructural and laboratory needs. The time table approved by the committee and by the Principal is uploaded on the college website and communicated to the Teacher-in-charge of the various departments. • Teacher-in charges allocates the paper in consultation with the department faculty members keeping in mind the expertise and subject specialization of faculty members, Each teacher also prepares teaching plan before the start of the semester that helps students organize the topics to be covered. • Evaluation of the student is strictly monitored by arranging tutorials, discussions and class tests • Monthly attendance of the students and internal assessment marks, are uploaded on the college website at the end of the semester. The college has developed an

in-house online portal for submission of attendance and internal assessment by teachers. • Departmental and Central Internal Assessment Committees address the grievances of the stakeholders also. • SVC believes in the academic flexibility in catering the subject options and choices to the students. Introduction of certificate courses, enhance the opportunities for jobs and employment to the students. • To enhance the knowledge, the departments arrange educational tours and excursions, talks and discussions, seminars & conferences, workshops and film screening etc. to supplement and complement the prescribed syllabus.

Feedback Obtained
<p>The College has designed and developed a feedback system for its stakeholders by online mode. Feedback from Students, Hostel students and parents are collected and analyzed. Student feedback is taken on various aspects of the College that includes the information on teaching-learning practices - pedagogy, evaluation, discipline, internal assessment teaching ethics. It also includes views on infrastructure like classrooms, ICT facilities, library, college canteen, laboratory facilities, hostel facilities and Sports facilities. Students residing in the hostel were provided with a separate feedback on facilities in the hostel, admission process, general cleanliness, and staff in both boys girls hostels and general rules for residents laid down by the college. Several actions have been taken on the issues of food, cleanliness and general grievances of the students from time to time. Parent feedback was also obtained that involved feedback on admission process, College infrastructure, regularity of classes, faculty strength, ICT facilities, extracurricular activities, sports /hostel facilities, placement career counseling, exposure to research contribution and activities that contribute towards holistic development of an enrolled student. Feedbacks were reported about each subject with areas of improvement.</p>

### 2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

The student mentoring system at Sri Venkateswara College is carried out in a meticulous manner at different levels. The main objectives of doing so is to diligently address the inter personal conflicts among students and also inculcate appropriate approach, aiming at their attitudes, habits, and knowledge , towards learning practices for which the curriculum is designed and to safeguard the ethos of the Institution. • Department Mentoring System: Every faculty in the department is assigned 10-15 students to mentor. Meetings are held to counsel any problems of the students – both personal and academic. This is a continuous process till the end of academic career of the student. The final semester students are also advised for their future career plans i.e., they are advised about various competitive exams for higher studies along with proper career guidance. Reasonable numbers of students who have secured admissions for their higher studies are requested to guide their juniors for their prospective admissions. The department also counsels students with poor attendance/performance. Corrective and preventive measures are suggested for further improvement. • Student Counselor: The College has appointed a counselor on contractual basis for psychological healing and helps overcomes issues related to student life. The Counselor also assists Teachers if the need be. • Academic and Research Mentors: The faculty mentors act as guides to the students during their summer internship projects. Sri Venkateswara College has offered 4-6 weeks summer internship programs under SRVIPRA program ( SRI Venkateswara Internship

Program for Research in Academics ) and it is open to all undergraduate students of the college. • Staff Adviser to Students appointed by the Staff Council of the college to advise the students on student activities like Elections and guide student union activities • The IQAC of college has organized Career counseling sessions for final year students with speakers from Industry, Academia and Alumni . • Alumni Interaction : Departments also invite Alumni to interact with students for career guidance and mentoring • College Societies/Associations like NSS, WDC, Eco-Club sensitize students on many issues like, health, environment, gender issues, ethics moral values, women empowerment and social responsibility. Faculty mentors guide students in organizing various activities. Students are provided a platform to interact with several NGOs during such talks and meetings • Equal Opportunity Cell (EOC) EOC of the college is active in creating an equal space for students with disabilities and minorities. All possible efforts are made to enable students with disability to be a part of the mainstream through inclusion in college programs rural tours, festivals, city tours fine arts and talent hunts. Faculty coordinator mentors and provide guidance to all students working under EOC. • The Anti-Ragging Committee ensures that no new student faces any mental or physical harassment in the College. The College has also constituted Internal Complaint Committees, as is mandatory by all HE Institutions and workplaces , for prevention of sexual harassment and caste based discrimination. • Outstation students and foreign students are counseled routinely.

2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The examination and continuous evaluation are conducted strictly according to the set guidelines laid down by the University of Delhi. The guidelines are available on the university as well as college website, and are also conveyed to students by the teachers during classroom interactions and at the beginning of every new session. The stakeholders of the institution are conveyed about the evaluation process in the following ways: • Freshly joined students are appraised very clearly during the orientation programme , in the beginning of the academic session , about the relevance of attendance. • They are provided the information regarding different assessment processes like tests/quizzes, assignments, projects, case studies, presentations, etc. through the college prospectus. • The college notice boards display all circulars from the university regarding evaluation, and also the last dates for submission of assignments and conduction of tests. • Teachers upload the marks and attendance given to their respective students on the Student Information Portal developed in-house on a regular basis. This data is accessible to all students. • A moderation committee is set up in each department to analyze the internal assessment marks submitted by the teachers. The moderation committee meets at the end of every semester to review the internal assessment of the students. • A student can approach the concerned teacher or Grievance Cell or the Principal in case of any discrepancy in marks, attendance or in evaluation process • Though Internal Assessment is mandatory as per DU rules , the college allows the students to improve their performance, and conducts more and more tests for their practice • Students are also counseled in contact periods and given special attention in case they are not attentive in their studies

The proper procedures to be followed are suggested and recommended by the purchase committee. Laboratory: i) Utilization of lab space for regular classes is proposed by Teacher in Charges in consultation with faculty members of the Department and the Time Table Committee. (ii) Instruments purchased at different times are recorded in a specified book, maintained by the Heads of the departments. New instruments are purchased from time to time. Meetings are held regularly to implement new rules and regulations and the same is notified to all the Departments and other users of the facility by notices/website. ICT Committee is involved in the purchase of software for library management. Sports complex: Purchase and policies related to sports are taken up by the Sports committee of the College. Notices regarding the purchases related to sports, sports events are displayed on the noticeboard and college website. Computers ICT Facility: Sri Venkateswara College has ICT Enablement Committee that is responsible for ICT facility in the College. The marks thus obtained, are uploaded through an online portal for the students and grievances, if any, are addressed by the Internal Assessment Committee of the College. At the beginning of every semester, the Principal holds meetings with Departments to review the academic results of the students.

Teaching and Learning

Faculty members prepare the semester plans in conformity to the prescribed schedule. They also use innovative methods of teaching, at times involving the ICT, to ensure that the students feel more curious and understand the subject better. In order to contribute to the teaching- learning process lectures are organized by subject experts. Various workshops and seminars are also conducted. Such student seminars and group presentations make confident students who can explore beyond the curriculum. Classes for weak learners were held regularly. Proper care is also ensured for the physically challenged students. The Equal Opportunity Cell ( EOC ) also organizes special classes for them

Curriculum Development

As Sri Venkateswara College is a constituent College affiliated to the University of Delhi, here the curriculum prescribed by the University for all the courses are offered by the College. Whenever the various Departments at the University organize curriculum development sessions, various faculty representatives participate in the same. From time to time eminent speakers /scientists with domain expertise are invited to

interact with students. Further, alumni feedback also is taken into consideration so as to ensure worthy employment opportunities while curriculum development.

#### 7.1.7 – Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly (at least five)

1. In-house Vermicomposting facility: In order to make college a green space and reduce the amount of waste produced an initiative was taken to establish vermicomposting in college by Eco-Club SVC. A well-established vermicompost pit is fully functional in college. The pit is maintained by staff and student volunteers of Eco-club. A hands-on training was given to 20 students for the same. A team of 30 volunteers presently are working efficiently by ensuring proper moisture content in the litter, managing the pit and taking care of the worms. Till now about 120kgs of compost has been prepared and we are hopeful of increasing it further. 2. Survey and Conservation of Butterfly Dragonfly in college campus: Butterflies and Dragonflies are indicator species, and are also provide several ecosystem services. In order to create awareness among students about the rich biodiversity in the campus, and to sensitize them towards the relevance of its conservation, campus survey was conducted to record the numerical strength and diversity of Butterfly and Dragonfly populations in the campus. The survey was conducted by Eco-Club in association with experts from Asola Bhatti Wildlife Sanctuary. 3. Solar powered streetlights: Streetlights of SVC campus are solar powered 4. Record and digitization of flora and fauna: The herbaceous flora and avian fauna of the campus has been well documents and digitized. 5. Waste segregation: College promotes and practices waste segregation, and separate color coded waste bins are used to segregate waste. 6. E-waste collection: The college conducts e-waste collection drives at various occasion to make students and staff aware about e-waste collection protocols and also reduce unscientific disposal of e-waste.

#### 7.2 – Best Practices

##### 7.2.1 – Describe at least two institutional best practices

1. Title of the Practice: Equity and Inclusiveness 2. Objectives of the Practice: The best practice aims at creating conducive learning environment for all the students. The institution acknowledges the diversity of students as there are students coming from different socio-cultural, linguistic, regional and economic background. Also, there are students with different physical and learning abilities, who need special and tailored physical as well as academic infrastructure. Faculty members and staff are sensitive towards the diverse needs of students and ensure that their stay in the college is full of pleasant memories 3. TheContext: The college, as mentioned earlier has a wide variety of students coming from different backgrounds. The challenging task was to bring them all together under one platform and yet address their unique needs. Say for instance, the teacher in the classroom often encounters a bunch of English-speaking students who come from private schools, a bunch from Hindi speaking government schools and a bunch of students who speak neither English nor Hindi but Telugu or Tamil. In a situation such as this the teacher in the classroom often adopts a bilingual mode of teaching for the English and Hindi medium students and for the Tamil/Telugu speaking students, the teacher tries to communicate in as simple language as possible for their comprehensive understanding. 4. ThePractice: Under equity and inclusiveness, the college ensures that all students get equal access to physical facilities and learning resources, irrespective of their physical or learning challenges faced by them.

Various societies and student union ensures that the campus is an inclusive space and provides conducive environment for the existence and expression of diversity in all forms. Sri Venkateswara College gives a academic and social ecosystem in which students from different states of the country and abroad, speaking different languages, and having their own sexual identity have their own niche spaces that are not infringed upon. Additionally, the faculty in particular are very sensitive towards the need of slow learners or students with learning difficulties, and time and again appropriate measures are taken to help them have complete understanding of the subject at their own pace. A few of the measures taken under equity and inclusiveness are listed below:

- Learning challenges: Special remedial classes are held for the students who have learning challenges or are slow learners.
- Regional inclusiveness: The college has a North-east club that organizes festivals to celebrate the culture of north-eastern states
- Linguistic inclusiveness: Undergraduate courses in Tamil and Telugu
- Differently abled: Physical facilities such as Ramps, walkways, Braille readers, Braille books and associated software are present in the college to facilitate smooth learning
- Student union involvement
- Gender equity: Third gender sensitization

5. Evidence of Success: Remedial classes have been proved to be very helpful for students who have different learning pace. Improvement has been observed in their understanding as well as scoring of marks. Students from different states stay in hostel which gives them a very conducive home-like environment. There is no discrimination of any form in the college as well as in hostel. The college provides a very inclusive and congenial environment and students often call it their second home.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

- To attend to the needs of such divergent groups and to keep them united.
- Conducting remedial classes and communicating with students from the Hindi medium in the absence of translations for English texts especially in the humanities
- trying to integrate the students of the North East with the mainstream by sensitizing the mainstream to the unique requirements of the North Eastern students
- To understand and comprehend the problems faced by Tamil/Telugu students and their specific needs
- Being a co-ed institution enforcing a social environment conducive to the growth of all sexes including the third gender
- Resources to have better learning modules as well as pedagogic techniques for each of the above-mentioned categories including differently abled students.

2. Title of the Practice: ICT enabled teaching-learning process

2. Objectives of the Practice The best practice aims at achieving academic targets in spite of the pandemic. In the absence of classroom teaching, the faculty members and students have adopted to technology facilitated learning.

3. The Context In the academic year 2019-20, educational institutions faced a peculiar challenge of going digital in almost no time to prepare for the same. Faculty, students as well as administrative staff of Sri Venkateswara College very quickly adopted the new normal. Preparation to ensure smooth teaching-learning and timely completion of administrative tasks by using only digital mode of interaction.

4. The Practice Covid-19 pandemic has pushed the various society structures to explore new horizons. Educational institutions are no exception to it. Due to lockdown and stay at home orders, physical classroom teaching was not possible since March 2020. Faculty members and students of the college were very prompt and quick in switching over to digital teaching-learning mode

Teaching-Learning:

- Classes have been regularly held during the pandemic by using various digital platforms such as Ms Team, Google classrooms, Google meet and Zoom
- Students and staff were provided with MS Teams account from the University of Delhi, and it was used to conduct classes

Evaluation and Assessment:

- Evaluation and students' progress was closely monitored and digital platforms such as Google classrooms and Ms Team were used for disseminating and evaluation of assignments and internal assessment
- Practical classes in Science were also conducted in digital mode and students were taught using virtual labs, simulation sheets and data sets to compensate for the lack of physical exposure to laboratories
- Since the

college is a constituent college of the university of Delhi, Open Book Examination was conducted for all the students of different courses and semester • Semester end Final OBE examinations conducted as per DU guidelines. • Nodal officers were appointed to clarify any exam related query. • Practical examinations and internal assessment evaluation was conducted through various digital platforms such as Ms team and Google meet/classroom • Evaluation of the term end and semester end examinations was conducted by teachers by accessing the examination portal created by the University of Delhi, and marks were uploaded on the same Faculty Development Programs • The college conducted Faculty Development Program "ICT Enhance Teaching and Learning 2.0" from 25th-29th July 2020 to orient faculty towards digital teaching-learning • Faculty members also participated in Orientation Programs/ Refresher courses focusing on E-Content Development , E-resources and other modern pedagogical tools conducted by academic staff colleges, TLCs of UGC, other institutions. 5. Evidence of Success Success of online mode of teaching and learning can be gauged from the fact that the pass percent in almost all courses has been 100. Teachers have played role of mentors very efficiently and the mentor-mentee interaction has helped in addressing academic and other issues of students in a very sensitive manner. Online feedback and surveys conducted by various departments have reinforced the satisfaction students have experienced in the online teaching-learning. College has been very sensitive in handling issues faced by teachers as well as students. 6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required Major issues faced during digital teaching learning were: • Weak, poor or absence of Network was a major issue faced by students as well as staff • Students living in areas such as Kashmir and Ladakh faced more internet challenges as compared to others • Differently abled students also faced challenges during digital learning • Scarcity of resource material particularly for some topics/courses was also a challenge.

Sri Venkateswara College well recognizes the relevance of addressing key environmental issues such as Pollution and its effects on human health. These issues are discussed and deliberated upon on several platforms and are an integral part of the various programs conducted under the aegis of Eco club. Environmental Outreach programs: Green School Initiative One such interesting program that is conducted throughout the year is the Green school Initiative in which society at large and school children in particular are made aware and sensitized towards challenging environmental issues. The primary aim of the initiative is to create awareness among school children as their young minds are highly receptive, and they are the torch bearers of the future and unfortunately, also most vulnerable to the adverse impacts air pollution. School Children particularly, in the secondary stage i.e. class VI to X are the best targets for such sensitization programs as their mind is highly amenable and they grow into sensitive adults who are more responsible and empathetic towards the environment. As a part of this initiative, a team comprising faculty members and students from Sri Venkateswara College, and doctors from AIIMS conduct interactive sessions for school students. To encourage active participation from students, various competitions such as Poster Making on Recycled Paper for classes VII, Eco-Quiz for classes VIII and IX and Just a Minute for Classes XI were organized. Restoration of water body in Aravali

Biodiversity park:Aravali Biodiversity Park is located in NCR region, and is an ideal choice for restoration and amphibian survey. 8 species of frogs found there during the field work. A perennial water body in Aravali Biodiversity Park sustains anuran species like the Indian skitter frog, Pierrei's wart frog, Bull frog etc. throughout the year. . One of the students on our team documented the work at ABDP and compiled it in a short film named 'Croaking Frogs' uploaded on YouTube, which has also been nominated for award at "National Science Film festival 2020" and has already won third prize in "Films of Change 2020" award function by Mr. Prakash Jha (Renowned Bollywood Film Maker). Vermicomposting facility: In order to make college a green space and reduce the amount of waste produced an initiative was taken to establish vermicomposting in college by Eco-Club SVC. The vermicompost pit is being maintained successfully in the campus. A hands-on training was given to 20 students who were interested to be a part and make this project a great success. A team of 30 volunteers presently are working efficiently by ensuring proper moisture content in the litter, managing the pit and taking care of the worms. Initially project was started in only one pit but gradually due to proper care the worms double in number and thus now two pits are managed. Till now about 120kgs of compost has been prepared and we are hopeful of increasing it further. Dr. Vartika Mathur delivered a talk entitled 'Role of earthworm and vermicomposting', which was followed by a hand-on training session.
